Guidelines are as follows:

- o after the first 3 transcripts students will need to pay \$2 for each additional transcript
- o student will be handed an official transcript in a CATA envelope, upon receipt of the \$2 fee
- o student will be responsible for addressing and mailing the envelope containing their transcript
- o If you are applying to a N.C. college or university, please send your transcripts through the Transcript Manager on CFNC's website.

Historic Old Salem Trip

On Wednesday, March 26th Mrs. Janicki's class took their annual trip to Historic Old Salem. The English III classes take this trip to tie into their classroom discussions and readings of Colonial Literature. Ms. Christensen's Broadcasting class also went on the trip to document the events. The classes visited on Arts Alive day where History and Arts collide! Upon their arrival in Old Salem, students were given papers so they could participate in a scavenger hunt to find different examples of architecture throughout the town. Mrs. Janicki also encouraged students to get pictures of themselves with as many people in period costume as possible.



While touring the many buildings in Old Salem, students had the opportunity to learn about different types of arts

and crafts what were practiced, as well as trades. The first stop was the Timothy Vogler Gunsmith Shop where students learned that children rarely went to school past age 13 before becoming an apprentice to learn a trade.

In the Single Brother's House, students learned about the 1798 Tannenberg Organ, Baroque and Neo-Classical pottery, making paste paper for booklets, tailoring and using wood block stamps. In the Single Brother's Workshop, students had to pay attention to detail by matching photo samples they were given with larger photos. There was also a giant wooden frame in another room along with different hats and props so students could be in their own picture frame photo.

At the Vierling House the students learned about how medicine was practiced in Old Salem. They saw where the doctor's apothecary was located and saw some medical instruments from that time. In another room of the house the students saw a demonstration of Fraktur painting. This beautiful art form consisted of elaborate lettering and intricate borders that were a combination of painting and cut paper work. In the Vierling barn some students got to try their hand at creating a Theorem painting using a stencil.

The last stop, and everyone's favorite, was the Winkler Bakery. Here the bakery oven is still heated with wood as it was almost 200 years ago. Students can watch a demonstration and then head into the shopping area to purchase Moravian cookies, sugar loaf and other delicious treats.

Parchman Hour Honored Again!

This week the cast, crew, and directors for the Parchman Hour were recognized by the UCPS Board of Education for their award-winning production. Dr. Ellis, Superintendent, introduced the CATA group and the students and teachers were able to receive individual congratulations from every UCPS BOE member.

Advisory Subject: Communicating with Teachers and professors.

Teachers and students met in Advisory this past Wednesday to take some time to "talk about" how you "talk with" a teacher, or for those seniors heading off to college – a professor. The first topic covered was **How do I communicate with a teacher or professor in a responsible manner?** Discussion, and the guiding video, discussed that talking to a teacher/professor–out of genuine curiosity, a genuine interest in learning, a genuine desire to improve–is one of the smartest things a student can do.

The next topic covered was <u>What about e-mailing a teacher or professor?</u> In these modern times, many people find that e-mailing is an ideal way to communicate. This is especially true when requesting a meeting, asking a brief clarifying question, or seeking some small bit of information related to the topic immediately at hand. However, there are a few things to remember about e-mailing. We have included the list that was discussed with students here in the Chronicle for reference.

- Always fill in the subject line with a specific, but brief, comment. "Request for meeting" will often work best if you are going to ask to the professor for a meeting.
- Address the teacher/professor directly and state who you are and which class you are in. Teachers/professors have many students and may not immediately know your name.
- Put your main idea in the opening sentence. Keep the message brief but informative enough that the professor knows the perimeters of your concern. Two to four sentences is normally sufficient.
- Remember KISS Keep it simple, silly. When we send out a long email, you are essentially saying "I do not respect your time." Show you appreciate his/her time, by making the message short and simple to answer. Use as few words as possible.
- Do not use all capital letters. This is equivalent to shouting. Likewise, do not use all lowercase letters.
- Use standard/proper grammar and spelling. Leave abbreviations associated with chat-rooms and texting for informal chats with friends.
- Leave the emoticons for friends and family as well. They should not be included in professional communications.
- Remember to use "please" and "thank you" and mean it.
- Include a signature box with contact information.
- Proof read the message at least twice to be sure it includes sufficient information and has a professional tone.
- Do not assume privacy with this or any other e-mail message. Therefore, do not include any personal information that you are not willing to share with the world.
- Provide adequate time for receiving a response. Teachers/professors have classes and meetings to attend. Often, they do not have time to respond to e-mails except in the early morning pre-class minutes or late in the day after classes have concluded.
- Finally, respond as quickly as you can. Be sure to thank the professor for responding to you and establishing a meeting time. Be sure to jot down the time and place of your meeting in your planner or electronic device.

Students that should consider this are students that need an additional pre-requisite for a class they want to take, or to take a class they cannot fit in their schedule at school.

- Summer classes begin June 16 and end August 8

- Time Commitment: Students will have 3 to 5 HOURS OF WORK EACH DAY (depending on the course), Monday through Friday. These are our 18-week courses that are taught over an 8-week period. Students must have daily access to the Internet for the duration of summer school. There are no exceptions made for students who attend camps or go on vacations where they do not have access to the Internet.
- Courses that you take are listed on your transcript as virtual courses, and the grade you earn is on your transcript as well.

- To register—see your guidance counselor. Space is limited.
- All questions about grades and requirements in a virtual class must go to the online teacher.
- It is our experience that students that typically struggle to hand in work or study for exams, will struggle MORE in an online class due to the self-discipline required.

Symphonic Band, Chorus Soar at MPA

Students from CATA's **symphonic band** program recently travelled to Hickory Ridge High School where they performed in their annual MPA performance. Every spring, middle and high school band students across the state prepare for and perform in the North Carolina Music Performance Assessment (MPA), which is much like a performance EOC exam for band. During the assessment process, bands perform three prepared pieces and play one piece they have never seen before, a process called sight reading. Four judges, called



adjudicators, evaluate the student musicians and the band director as they perform and sight read, then assign a score based on how accurately and musically the students and band director perform. The scores are then compiled and each band is assigned an overall rating of Superior, Excellent, Good, Fair, or Poor. More importantly, the rating sheet from each adjudicator is filled with helpful comments and feedback that band directors use as a resource to guide students to greater musical achievement.

Bands in Union County are not required to attend MPA, but Ms. Craven and the CATA band program choose to participate in MPA because we feel that it is important to hold ourselves to a high standard of performance. Attending MPA allows us to acquire valuable feedback from music professionals regarding our musical growth. We believe that preparing for and performing at MPA motivates student musicians to reach new levels of technical mastery on their instrument and, more importantly, deepen their understanding of what it truly means to be a contributing part of a musical ensemble. Performing at MPA is a way for the CATA band program to measure our progress in a meaningful way as we grow in size and strength in the coming years.

This year's MPA scores were through the roof! For the first time in CATA history, the band received "A's" in all seven categories from all four adjudicators. Hats off to our student musicians who pushed themselves to master new skills and develop their musicality during this year's MPA preparation. We are so proud of you! Chorus, under the direction of Ms. Watwood, also attended MPA this past week, following an adjudicator process similar to the process described above. The Chorus did a Great Job!! Chorus earned 1 Superior and 2 Excellents!! Their overall average was 89; only one point away from an overall Superior Rating! Way to go CATA Chorus!!
