

Choices: Now is the time to begin narrowing your college selection choices down from 5 to 1. A college visit is critical when selecting that final college. During the fall, colleges will have "Open Houses"; these events are planned with the idea of helping you select your final college. At a Senior Open House Visit, you will not only tour the school, you will be able to see the college housing (actual rooms), sit in a college class, eat the food, and ask questions. A visit will help you decide if the school really is all you hoped it would be. Go on line and check the college web site for the visitation dates. You may visit three colleges a year; bring something back stating you were involved in a college visit, and the days are excused.

Key Questions When Choosing a College

- · Does the college have my major or career?
- · Is the college location, one
- that is a fit for me? (ASU has cold weather)
- What percentage of the college freshman stay at the college?
- · What percent of graduates are accepted to graduate, medical, or law school?
- · What is the typical class size and how much individual attention will I receive?
- · Are there opportunities for internships and/or travel abroad?
- Do professors or graduate students teach freshman courses?




Cougar Pride

10th YEAR GUIDANCE INFORMATION

GPA - Continue to pull up your GPA. The transcript you send for college acceptance, scholarships, and NCAA Clearinghouse reflect the grades you have made through the end of your junior year.

PSAT- given to **Geometry** students in October. Test is a good predictor of how you will do on the SAT. It is also a good idea to take the PSAT **again** in your junior year before you take the SAT in the spring.

PLAN-given to all sophomores in October. It is a good predictor of how you will perform on the ACT. This year's test will be **October 2**.

SAT/ACT - You take the ACT and SAT in the spring of your junior year. You will be given the ACT in your junior year at CATA free of charge. After you receive your scores, take a second test from the test you scored higher on. The ACT covers Math, Verbal, Science, and writing; you need to answer all questions. The SAT covers Math, Verbal, and Writing; you do not answer the questions you do not know. If you can omit the incorrect answers and make an educated guess, do so. Each incorrect answer counts 1/4 of a point off your score. The average SAT score is 1500; the average ACT score is 21. Scores for scholarships must be much higher. Do not make the mistake of coming into your senior year without a test score. www.college.com has a SAT question of the day and material that will help you prepare for the SAT. CATA will give you an ACT in the spring of your junior year.



Scholarships-You apply for scholarships in your senior year, BUT you should begin searching for them now. Below are some web sites that will assist you in your search for scholarships. Please keep in mind that most of the scholarship money comes from the college and you must meet their criteria to apply. For the most part, scholarship money from the public colleges is need-based. The SAT/ACT score are very important when applying for a scholarship. Most scholarships are interested in your character, leadership, community service, and extracurricular activities. Keep a calendar of all your community service; note what you did and how long you worked.

he state mandated **PLAN test** will be administered to all 10th grade CATA students on **Wednesday**, **October 2**, **2013**. The test is designed to be administered within a half day school supervised session and should last about 3 hours and 20 minutes. The PLAN test serves as the midpoint measure of academic progress in ACT's College and Career Readiness System and will aid students in preparing to take the ACT test during their 11th grade year. In other words, this is a pre-ACT exam. Scores are not reported to any colleges, but can be used by parents, students, and the school to gauge how students will do on the ACT. This is an important exam.

Electrifying English

Dr. Tarlton's English classes have been very busy with hands on learning. Each of his classes has been doing units of study that require them to be up and about exploring elements of literary genres. In AP English, students have been studying the qualities of Transcendentalism, a part of the Romantics that focused on the divine soul and nature to discover oneself. These students took a 30 minute nature walk on Thursday of last week and utilized Emerson's quote of "It's not what you are looking at, it's what you see" to help guide them in the walk. Students then took what they saw and wrote a poem based on their observations. These poems will be published on Dr. Tarlton's Moodle page later this week. In English I, students are working with poetry and the TPCASTT model to analyze the elements of the poetry. Last week students read "Spring is like a withered hand," "Elegy to the Giant

"Spring is like a withered hand," "Elegy to the Giant Tortoises," and "Today". They read the poems, completed the TPCASTT, and then had to write a Parody Poem. Pictures of these parody poems can be found

on Moodle as well. This unit culminates on Monday with students presenting their favorite songs that they have had approved and analyzed. We can't wait to see what else happens this year as we "Fall" into English.

Parents Role in Prevention of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Other Drug Use

(this article is taken from the UCPS Safety Net newsletter. Please <u>click here</u> to see the whole newsletter with very important information for all school age children).

Parents can prevent alcohol, tobacco and other drug (ATOD) use and misuse by adolescents in many ways.

- Talk early and often about your family's views and rules about ATOD use. These talks can
 make a big impression on children, especially if they happen before the child is in a situation in which alcohol or drugs are available.
- Place any prescription drugs or alcohol in a safe place that you monitor frequently, preferably under lock-and-key.
- Do not host parties where alcohol is served to minors. Do not serve alcohol to your own children in your home. These measures will not prevent alcohol problems or teach "safe drinking." They are more likely to teach your children that underage drinking is acceptable, plus parents can be legally responsible for any problems or injuries resulting from serving alcohol to minors.
- Talk with your children about how media advertisements, television, movies can present false and misleading messages that alcohol, tobacco and other drugs are fun and without risks.
- Encourage your child's interest in other activities such as school clubs, sports or arts. Involvement in these activities may decrease or prevent involvement with ATOD use.
