PSAT - Wednesday, October 15th, 2014

The PSAT will be given to all **JUNIORS** this year free of charge! The PSAT is a practice test for the SAT and juniors can earn National Merit Scholarship opportunities based on the earned score. <u>9th and 10th grade</u> students had the opportunity to take the PSAT too if the signed up by Friday, September 26th. Students – are you interested in **SAT or ACT test prep**? UNC Charlotte, in partnership with The Princeton Review, offers the ACT and SAT exam prep courses at a discounted rate! Online and classroom formats are available that provide critical test-taking techniques, realistic testing practice with proctored exams, and drills/homework assignments to practice outside class. Students will get 18 hours of in-person or online instructor-led prep, four proctored tests, and access to additional video lessons and online practice drills. The Governor's School of North Carolina is a five-week summer residential program for intellectually gifted high school students, integrating academic disciplines, the arts, and unique courses on each of two campuses. The curriculum focuses on the exploration of the most recent ideas and concepts in each discipline, and does not involve credit, tests, or grades.

The Governor's School is the oldest statewide summer residential program for academically or intellectually gifted high school students in the nation. The program, which is open to rising seniors only, with exceptions made for rising juniors in selected performing/visual arts areas, is located on two campuses of up to 305 students each: Governor's School West at <u>Salem College</u> in Winston-Salem (begun in

1963), and Governor's School East at <u>Meredith College</u> in Raleigh (begun in 1978). The program is administered by the Public Schools of North Carolina, the State Board of Education, and the Department of Public Instruction through the Exceptional Children Division. A Board of Governors, appointed by the State Board of Education, acts as an advisory body. Applications are available in the guidance office. **The completed application is due to Ms. Lawson on Friday, October 17th at 3:30 pm**. Please see Ms. Lawson with any questions.

American College Testing - THE ACT

The ACT will be given to all juniors **FREE** on **March 3rd**, **2015**! Preparing and doing well on the ACT will have <u>long term benefits</u>. The most important that your student has the <u>opportunity to take a college entrance exam for</u>

and universities throughout the country will <u>accept an ACT score</u> (previously some colleges and universities only would accept the SAT but that is no longer the case). The second benefit is that students will be able to list <u>four colleges or universities to send the score directly to - this is also FREE</u>! The third and final benefit is that your student could <u>potentially earn scholarships to college</u>!!!!! If they score within the high range (28 to 32) they could earn a full scholarship to many colleges and universities throughout the country. It is also possible to earn in-state tuition to surrounding state colleges or universities - for example The University of South Carolina and Clemson!!! **Please take time to communicate with your 11th grade student the importance of the ACT!!** Community Colleges also use the ACT score, as well as potential employers.

Preparation for Juniors at CATA—All Juniors at CATA are participating in guided ACT preparation during Cougar Time. A short instructional video along with time for independent practice in the ACT Prep—Cracking the ACT book will be provided. The school has purchased the books to be used as texts, however, students wishing to write in the books should bring in \$20 on Tuesday so that they can write in the book. Students not buying the book should be sure to have a small notebook or paper to practice on.










"Giving Back"

Giving back to your community is a very important thing for everyone to do; the young, the old and everyone in between! Volunteering is a great way to give back especially for us high school students, who usually don't have the means to give much financially.

I have found a local non-profit agency, HealthQuest of Union County, where I have been able to find multiple opportunities to do my part in my community. HealthQuest is a licensed non-profit pharmacy that provides free prescription medications to residents of Union, Anson, Stanly, Lancaster and Chesterfield counties who cannot afford prescriptions for their chronic medical conditions. HealthQuest helps those who do not have private insurance or qualify for government assistance. If it were not for

HealthQuest these individuals would simply have to do without their medications for conditions like: high blood pressure and cholesterol, diabetes, depression, and many others. Each month, just over 1,000 individuals receive their monthly medications at HealthQuest. Since opening in 1999, they have distributed over 550,000 prescriptions valued at \$67.8 million. Clients are asked, but not required, to pay a \$20 administrative fee once a month and receive on average 4-5 prescriptions with a value of \$745.

Volunteering to do clerical work at the once a week medication dispense has probably been the most touching volunteer experience I have ever had. Seeing first hand the clients and how grateful they are to be receiving their medication is quite an humbling experience. You realize quickly how your volunteerism is making a direct impact on someone's life...on their health and well being. It changes your perspective on yourself, as well as others. Faces become attached to the cause. Those faces and that cause then become engrained in your heart. In turn, you can't wait for the next opportunity you can be of help.

My next volunteer opportunity came in May of this year. Rachel Nance (a then CATA senior) and I volunteered at the "Clean Up for Health-Quest." This was no easy work! Our volunteer teams removed over 2 tons/ 4,000 lbs. of debris (trash & recyclables) from our county road sides. Through team sponsors and corporate donations this event alone raised \$10,422 for HealthQuest! This made all that hard work worthwhile. Not to mention how much this volunteer experience changed my perspective regarding littering and keeping our community clean.

On Sept. 6, CATA sophomore Hannah Hildreth and I volunteered with some other friends as workers at the "Amazing Charity Race for HealthQuest." This event, much like the television show, had teams of 4-5 people who competed against other teams in physical and mental challenges. At the end of the day, the winning team received \$2,000 for the charity of their choice. CATA's own Dr. Tarlton was a race participant. I've been told he had trouble getting out of bed the next morning!

Team entrance fees, corporate sponsors, a BBQ and silent auction all tallied up to HealthQuest raising close to \$60,000 for this event alone! \$60,000 to help HealthQuest clients get their medications. My helping to set up for this event, delivering water to race participants, distributing BBQ plates and silent auction items, helped to raise that money. I'm proud of that.

There are many worthy causes in our community that could use your help. I challenge you to find one and let it grow your heart for volunteering!





The National Underground Railroad Freedom Center, located on the banks of the Ohio River in Cincinnati, Ohio, along with sponsors proudly announce the 2014 Picture Freedom Art Competition. The Freedom Center's mission is to reveal stories about freedom's heroes from the era of the Underground Railroad to contemporary times, challenging and inspiring everyone to take courageous steps towards freedom today. As the nation celebrates to 50th anniversary of the 1964 Civil Rights Act, we ask your students to create an artwork about what freedom means to them. We hope that by encouraging students to participate in this competition, they will become passionate advocates for freedom and equality today.

By drawing connections from the Underground Railroad to the Civil Rights Movement, the Picture Freedom Art Completion offers a unique opportunity that challenges students to reflect upon the rich and historical heritage of the fight for freedom and human rights. We encourage students to create original works of art; drawings, paintings, or photographs that convey their own vision of freedom and equality today. While it is not required, works of art can be inspired by freedom fighters, events, or places that resonate with the student's vision.

Students that submit an entry are eligible to win these prizes. The top twelve (12) artists will have their work displayed in the upcoming Picture Freedom exhibition at the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center. The top three (3) artists will receive airfare and accommodations to attend the exhibition's Grand Opening in February 2015.
