American College Testing - THE ACT

The ACT will be given to all juniors **FREE** on **March 3rd**, **2015**! Preparing and doing well on the ACT will have <u>long term benefits</u>. The most important benefit is that your student has the <u>opportunity to take a college entrance exam for free</u>. All colleges and universities throughout the country will <u>accept an ACT score</u> (previously some colleges and universities only would accept the SAT but that is no longer the case). The second benefit is that students will be able to list <u>four colleges or universities to send the score directly to - this is also FREE</u>! The third and final benefit is that your student could <u>potentially earn scholarships to college!!!!!</u> If they score within the high range (28 to 32) they could earn a full scholarship to many colleges and universities throughout the country. It is also possible to earn instate tuition to surrounding state colleges or universities - for example The University of South Carolina and Clemson!!! **Please take time to communicate with your 11th grade student the importance of the ACT!!** Community Colleges also use the ACT score, as well as potential employers.

World Affairs Council Hosts CATA Students

If you are enjoying the lower gas prices at the pump, that is partly due to fracking. Hydraulic Fracking for oil and natural gas involves drilling a well around 2 miles deep into shale rock and turning that well horizontal for another two miles. A mix of fresh water, chemicals and sand is then pumped into the well at extreme pressures. This breaks or fractures the rock allowing natural gas and oil to rise to the surface. The United States has been extremely successful using this technology over the past decade. Ms. Kopchick's AP Environmental Science students were invited to a luncheon with Russell Gold, author of

<u>Boom: How Fracking Ignited the American Energy Revolution and Changed the World.</u> Russell Gold is the senior energy reporter for the Wall Street Journal. He is responsible for covering all facets of global energy with a particular focus on the U.S. energy boom and the use of hydraulic fracturing. His writings appear regularly in the print and on-line editions of The Wall Street Journal. The luncheon was hosted by The World Affairs Council of Charlotte.

As with many technologies, fracking has pros and cons. Mr. Gold addressed many concerns after his presentation with a question and answer session with students. Questions ranged from how fracking could affect the geopolitical climate around the world to the contamination of local aquifers. Emma Marvel commented, "This was a very enjoyable and educational field trip. We learned about the pros and cons of fracking. We were exposed to a very professional environment that helped further our educational experience." Students were very interested in learning about fracking since North Carolina has just passed legislature allowing fracking permits. Fracking brings in a lot of money to local economies and helps provide energy independence for the United States. Students also want to be assured that it is a safe technology.

Hydraulic Fracking is a major environmental issue in America today. By attending the presentation, students are able to participate in a very relevant topic and help educate others. "This was a once in a lifetime experience that the World Affairs Council provided us. I feel better informed about natural gas fracking." said Ryan Rognstad.
