This program awards a \$20,000.00 scholarship distributed incrementally over four years of study at UNCG. In addition to scholarships, the UNCG Teacher Education Fellows Program includes a variety of other benefits, including integrated seminars, early internships, networking events, community engagement opportunities, and leadership development. Attendance Letters and Recovery

-Attendance at school is a priority. It is so important to be present in order to learn and to gain opportunities for mastering coursework. This is also a very important life lesson for our children to learn—in life we have expectations of going to work and working to the best of our ability, and this good life habit starts with attendance at school.

- To ensure maximum student attendance we will be contacting students and parents when students reach 3, 6, and 8 absences.

-According to UCPS attendance policy students should not miss more than 7 classes in each class. The goal is to not miss ANY school, but if a student has a valid reason, such as an illness or other excused absence, they can have up to 7 absences and still pass the class.

-It is important that excuse notes be written and turned into the office within 3 days after an absence. After the three days, then the absences are recorded as unexcused permanently.

- At each absence threshold (3,6,8) CATA staff will make the determination if the student needs to begin the recovery process to make up absences and notify parents and students on how to make up time missed from school. Recovery should be done during the semester and in the two week time span given or the student will not be allowed to recover the absences at a later date.

-There are UCPS limits on how many classes can be recovered. Recovery will be held on Tuesdays and Thursdays after school with Ms. Riley, or with the student's individual teacher. Students are expected to work on content during recovery time. This plan is in place so that your student makes up content close to the date it was delivered in class.







Ms. Casey's Foods Classes Win Monroe Competition RECIPES

Cinnamon Roll Sugar Cookies 2 Cups sugar

- 1 Cup butter, softened
- 3 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 Cup sour cream
- 6 Cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking soda

2 teaspoons baking powder

1/4 teaspoon salt

12 tablespoons softened butter, (slice 2 Tablespoons 6 times totaling 12 tablespoons)

- 1 1/2 Cups packed light brown sugar, divided into 1/4 Cups
- 1 1/2 Tablespoons ground cinnamon, divided
- Frosting

8 oz softened cream cheese

1/2 Cup powdered sugar

2-4 Tablespoons milk, to thin icing

1. In an electric or stand mixer, cream the sugar and butter. Add eggs, vanilla and sour cream until well combined. Slowly add in the flour, baking soda, baking powder and salt until well combined.

CATA won 1st place for our Cinnamon Roll Sugar Cookies, 2nd place for our Melted Snowman Sugar cookies and 2nd place for our table decorations at the Holiday Bake Shop Fundraiser held at the City of Monroe's Tree Lighting this weekend. I couldn't be prouder of all the hard work my students put into this event!



2. In 2 batches, place in plastic wrap in a disc shape and chill for at least 2 hours for best results. 3. Once chilled, cut each disc into thirds and roll into a 1/8 inch thick oval, about 12 inches X 5 inches. Spread each rolled pieces of dough with 2 Tablespoons softened butter, 1/4 Cup packed brown sugar and 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon. Start rolling from the long end closest to you, rolling into a log shape. Using a sharp knife, cut 1/2 inch pieces of dough then placing onto a silpat or parchment lined baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 9-11 minutes. Remove and let cool for 5 minutes before removing from baking sheet.

4. To prepare frosting, beat the cream cheese until softened and smooth, slowly add powdered sugar and milk until desired consistency. Frost cookies then place in refrigerator until ready to serve. These are 100 times better chilled, trust me!!

Makes about 6 dozen





Sugar Cookie Recipe

- 1 c. butter
- $1\frac{1}{2}$ c. white sugar
- 3 eggs
- 1 t. vanilla
- 3 1/2 c. flour
- 2 t. cream of tartar
- 1 t. baking soda
- 1/2 t. salt

Cream the butter and sugar. (Do not move to the next step until butter and sugar have the consistency of whipped frosting, Trust me it's worth it!)

Add eggs one at a time. (Mix well after adding each egg)

Stir in the vanilla

Add flour, cream of tartar, baking soda & salt gradually to the creamed mixture. Stir by hand for this step Cover and chill overnight (or for a minimum of 2 hours) Roll out dough or use for drop cookies

Bake for 8-11 minutes @ 325 degrees

Melted snowman variation:

Bake cookies as per directions above and allow them to cool

While cookies are cooling, make royal icing (mix powdered sugar with water or milk). The consistency should be thick enough so it stays on cookie but not too runny so that it slides right off. Experiment!

Either spoon frosting over cookie or dip cookie into frosting face down.

Allow frosting to slightly set. (It will drip down the sides but this is what you want! It will look like melted snow!)

While the frosting is setting, spread butter on a microwave safe plate and then place marshmal-

lows on the plate (but do not let them touch or you will have a big mess!). Melt them in the microwave for about 10 seconds so they have the appearance they are "melting".

Place marshmallows on the edge of sugar cookie into the almost set frosting. If it won't stick, dip it into the frosting (this will act like glue).

Allow marshmallow to dry onto cookie

Using decorating frosting, draw face, arms and scarves on snowman.

Be creative!

Graduation: The ceremony is on Saturday, June 10, 2017 at 7:30 PM at the Winthrop Coliseum (701 Oakland Avenue Rock Hill, SC 29730). Please arrive no later than 6:30 to line up. Please be aware of traffic and plan accordingly to arrive on time. A map and directions will be provided for you on a later date. If you have any questions or need directions, then please visit the website (www.winthrop.edu). We will send more specific information about graduation day in the Spring Senior Class of 2017 Letter.

Graduation Practice: Practice is on Friday, June 9, 2017 from 2:00-4:00 PM in the gym. Please arrive no later than 1:45 PM. Be mindful that we must begin at 2:00. Please make sure to make plans to attend the entire practice. Failure to do so will result in not walking at graduation. It is your responsibility to schedule any college functions and work schedules around final exams, graduation practice, and graduation itself. You do not have to wear your cap and gown to practice. If you are speaking at graduation, then you should bring a copy of your speech so you can practice it a couple of times. You will not receive your tickets until the end of practice so make arrangements beforehand.

Attire: Students are expected to dress appropriately and professionally since this is a dignified

ceremony. Students at CATA are only permitted to wear CATA issued cords, medallions, and cap and gown. No graduation regalia may be altered in any way.

Ladies: Ladies will need to wear an appropriate dress (or dark slacks) that is no longer than their gown. There should be no collar showing with the gown. Shoes should be brown, tan, black, or navy since the robes are navy. Flip-flops and tennis shoes are not appropriate, however, dressy sandals are appropriate.

Graduation Speeches: Each academy has one senior give a speech at graduation. A committee of the faculty and staff of Central Academy choose the individuals for graduation speeches. Past due fees: Past due fees must be paid before students may participate in Prom or Graduation. Tickets: Tickets will be on sale beginning May 8– May 26 before/after school in the main office, and will also be available to be purchased online: Each senior will receive four (4) free tickets with the opportunity to buy extra tickets at \$7.00 a ticket.
