Ms. Kopchick's Earth Science Classes with a Real World Experience at Bearskin Creek

On Thursday October 20th Ms. Kopchick, along with 40 of her students, set out to cleanse the environment at Bearskin Creek in Monroe. The day prior to the field trip, storm water engineers from the City of Monroe visited Ms. Kopchick's Earth and Environmental Science class. Students learned how agricultural practices affect our surface waters such as cows bathing in our

rivers, and heavy rain washing sediment, debris and leaves into our fresh water. All these problems can be very expensive to clean. Sediment is the worst water pollutant. Sediment can suffocate fish by clogging their gills to a point where they can no longer breathe. Students also learned ways to prevent water

contamination. For example, construction workers can check if a heavy rain is expected. On these days, they should not throw up a lot of sediment. This dirt, after a big storm, washes down into our storm drains and right into our rivers. To prevent this, they can install silt fences to catch some of the runaway sediment. Other preventive practices include farmers fencing in their cows, as well as people recycling and not littering. People can also wash cars in the grass instead of on cement. Washing cars on cement lets the soap wash away and allows it to enter into storm drains and then continues into freshwater rivers. Once at Belk Tonawanda Park in Monroe, students had two goals. First to clean up two miles of Bearskin Creek and second to test the water quality. Students put on protective gear and those who wanted to go in the river put on water wading boots. Students found all sorts of items such as found basketballs, footballs, rims, tires, a shower chair, four golf balls, a jar filled with peanut butter, and a whole lot of glass bottles, and cans. After about two hours of cleaning, students tested the water quality. Students entered the finding on the World Water Monitoring Challenge Website. Attendance Letters and Recovery

- -Attendance at school is a priority. It is so important to be present in order to learn and to gain opportunities for mastering coursework. This is also a very important life lesson for our children to learn—in life we have expectations of going to work and working to the best of our ability, and this good life habit starts with attendance at school.
- To ensure maximum student attendance we will be contacting students and parents when students reach 3, 6, and 8 absences.
- -According to UCPS attendance policy students should not miss more than 7 classes in each class. The goal is to not miss ANY school, but if a student has a valid reason, such as an illness or other excused absence, they can have up to 7 absences and still pass the class.
- -It is important that excuse notes be written and turned into the office within 3 days after an absence. After the three days, then the absences are recorded as unexcused permanently.
- At each absence threshold (3,6,8) CATA staff will make the determination if the student needs to begin the recovery process to make up absences and notify parents and students on how to make up time missed from school. Recovery should be done during the semester and in the two week time span given or the student will not be allowed to recover the absences at a later date.
- -There are UCPS limits on how many classes can be recovered. Recovery will be held on Tuesdays and Thursdays after school with Ms. Riley, or with the student's individual teacher. Students are expected to work on content during recovery time. This plan is in place so that your student makes up content close to the date it was delivered in class.



Referendum Overview

Quality schools are essential to the residents of Union County. Our community recognizes that in order for students to receive an excellent education, they must have safe schools and a positive learning environment.

On Nov. 8, Union County residents will vote on \$54 million in school bonds. The bond package would provide funding for six school renovation/addition projects and a new transportation facility.

This bond is needed to address safety repairs, stability, the removal of long-term use of mobile classrooms in our schools and build a new transportation facility.

Funding would help Union County Public Schools prepare for growth, increase capacity at several schools and move students into brick and mortar classrooms. The bond will add an additional 88,400 square feet to Union County Public Schools.


