Society of Women Engineers Converse with other Women Engineers

The Society of Women Engineers members had the opportunity to Skype a female engineer during a recent club meeting. The purpose of interviewing engineers is to introduce SWE members to the numerous fields that they can go into and ask specific questions of a female engineer in that field.

SWE Skyped Erin Davis, a Biomedical Engineer who currently works with GE Healthcare and focuses on innovating medical devices. She has been working at GE Healthcare for a year and a half after participating in a co-op with them for 3 semesters. Ms. Davis graduated from Marquette University in Biomedical Engineering with a focus in Electrical Engineering.

SWE members had the chance to ask Ms. Davis questions about her background. One member asked why she chose to focus on Electrical Engineering within her Biomedical major. Ms. Davis' responded that she thought electrical circuits were interesting and that she understood circuits better than the majority of Biomedical students in classes with her. She thought studying electrical in addition to Biomedical engineering would set her apart from other students and make her more marketable when she graduated college.

Other questions addressed her treatment as a female engineer and what working for a large corporation is like. Ms. Davis said she has had no issues with gender inequalities despite working in a male dominant field. She also described how GE is reinventing its corporation to feel like many individual small businesses in order to appeal to the millennial generation. Two examples she gave were replacing annual reviews with more real time feedback and allowing flexible vacation time. Further topics included how Ms. Davis prepared for engineering in high school and why she picked engineering for a career field.

The Skype thirty minute interview with Ms. Davis was very enlightening to SWE members. It was a great opportunity for them to have various questions answered by a professional engineer in a field a lot of the members are interested in. Ms. Davis provided lots of helpful insight about being a professional engineer and also about being a female in a typically male dominated profession.






CATA Band Students Spread the Joy of Music Beyond the School Walls

Raleigh, N.C. – If you missed out on getting assistance with completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) on October 29th – FAFSA Day, additional help is on the way. State Employees' Credit Un-

This program awards a \$20,000.00 scholarship distributed incrementally over four years of study at UNCG. In addition to scholarships, the UNCG Teacher Education Fellows Program includes a variety of other benefits, including integrated seminars, early internships, networking events, community engagement opportunities, and leadership development. Fellows also live in relative proximity to one another as part of the Residential Colleges or Lloyd International Honors College. 

WE'VE GOT GLOWING BACTERIA IN MS. TURNER'S CLASS!

Mrs. Turner's Medical Intervention class is studying the benefits of bacteria--not something you hear very often. Bacteria are a very helpful tool in genetic engineering and the production of medication. Genetically engineered bacteria can be used as tiny living pharmaceutical factories and can produce many medications and drugs that help maintain health and homeostasis in the human body. Scientists use the tools of molecular biology to "cut and paste" genes of interest into bacterial plasmids. These plasmids can then be inserted into bacteria through the process of bacteria transformation. In this experiment, the class used bacterial transformation to insert the genetic information necessary to produce

another protein, green fluorescent protein, into the cells. Since this new protein glows a bright green, it is easy to gauge the success of the experiment and see the process of transformation work!

Attendance Letters and Recovery

- -Attendance at school is a priority. It is so important to be present in order to learn and to gain opportunities for mastering coursework. This is also a very important life lesson for our children to learn—in life we have expectations of going to work and working to the best of our ability, and this good life habit starts with attendance at school.
- To ensure maximum student attendance we will be contacting students and parents when students reach 3, 6, and 8 absences.
- -According to UCPS attendance policy students should not miss more than 7 classes in each class. The goal is to not miss ANY school, but if a student has a valid reason, such as an illness or other excused absence, they can have up to 7 absences and still pass the class.
- -It is important that excuse notes be written and turned into the office within 3 days after an absence. After the three days, then the absences are recorded as unexcused permanently.
- At each absence threshold (3,6,8) CATA staff will make the determination if the student needs to begin the recovery process to make up absences and notify parents and students on how to make up time missed from school. Recovery should be done during the semester and in the two week time span given or the student will not be allowed to recover the absences at a later date.
- -There are UCPS limits on how many classes can be recovered. Recovery will be held on Tuesdays and Thursdays after school with Ms. Riley, or with the student's individual teacher. Students are expected to work on content during recovery time. This plan is in place so that your student makes up content close to the date it was delivered in class.

Graduation: The ceremony is on Saturday, June 10, 2017 at 7:30 PM at the Winthrop Coliseum (1162 Eden Terrace, Rock Hill, SC 29733). Please arrive no later than 6:30 to line up. Please be aware of traffic and plan accordingly to arrive on time. A map and directions will be provided for you on a later date. If you have any questions or need directions, then please visit the website (www.winthrop.edu). We will send more specific information about graduation day in the Spring Senior Class of 2017 Letter.

Graduation Practice: Practice is on Friday, June 9, 2017 from 2:00-4:00 PM in the gym. Please arrive no later than 1:45 PM. Be mindful that we must begin at 2:00. Please make sure to make plans to attend the entire practice. Failure to do so will result in not walking at graduation. It is your responsibility to schedule any college functions and work schedules around final exams, graduation practice, and graduation itself. You do not have to wear your cap and gown to practice. If you are speaking at graduation, then you should bring a copy of your speech so you can practice it a couple of times. You will not receive your tickets until the end of practice so make arrangements beforehand.

Attire: Students are expected to dress appropriately and professionally since this is a dignified ceremony. Students at CATA are only permitted to wear CATA issued cords, medallions, and cap and gown. No graduation regalia may be altered in any way.

Ladies: Ladies will need to wear an appropriate dress (or dark slacks) that is no longer than their gown. There should be no collar showing with the gown. Graduation Speeches: Each academy has one senior give a speech at graduation. A committee of the faculty and staff of Central Academy choose the individuals for graduation speeches. Students may audition for consideration to this committee in May in the media center conference room. Please pay attention for the audition date in the announcements.
