Spotlight on the Medical Science Academy

The goal of the Project Lead the Way Biomedical Sciences (BMS) Program is to provide a sequence of courses, all aligned with appropriate national learning standards, which follows a proven hands-on, real-world problem-solving approach to learning. Students explore the concepts of human medicine and are introduced to topics such as physiology, genetics, microbiology and public health. Through activities, like dissection and experimentation, students examine the processes, structures and interactions of the human body. They also explore the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of disease. Students work collaboratively to investigate and design innovative solutions to the health challenges like fighting cancer with nanotechnology.

Work-based Learning Opportunities

Partnerships with the business community have been developed to allow qualified students in the Biomedical Sciences Academy to participate in job shadowing, internship or cooperative learning experiences.

College Advantage

Whether a student plans to attend a four-year university or two year associate program CATA offers all the required subjects necessary for post-secondary education. Many required courses in the Medical Science Academy carry honors credit. Advanced Placement (AP) opportunities also exist within the core curriculum. Successful completion of Honors and/or AP courses can boost a student's GPA.

Student Organization

HOSA's twofold mission is to promote career opportunities in the health care industry and to enhance the delivery of quality health care to all people. Participation in HOSA provides students with the critical soft-skills development that is essential in the 21st century employee.

Stop Motion in Ms. Turner's Classes

The students used the Stop Motion app on their phones to create projects that show the steps of an ELISA test. The ELISA is used in our curriculum to diagnose and help find patient zero in a meningitis outbreak on a college campus. A strep test and a pregnancy test are other examples of this type of antigen/antibody detection tests. We will show samples in future editions.

Medical Academy Students and Medical Spanish I

Did you know that CATA offers Medical Spanish I and II classes? These classes meet NC Graduation requirements and may be taken in place of regular Spanish I and II. How is Medical Spanish I different from Spanish I? If your student is contemplating going into the Medical Field this is a great option. The vocabulary and context for learning is different from the traditional Spanish I class, but the grammar concepts are the same. This course was crafted with great



care so that students learn the same grammar concepts as the traditional Spanish classes. The teacher uses the Medical Spanish textbook as the basis for the class and pulls from the internet to enrich the course. In the pictures, students are working collaboratively to identify vocabulary and meaning from children's books.

Ms. Turner's Medical Science Academy Class Spotlight

Freshmen students in Principles of Biomedical Science jumped into their Forensics unit this week as they investigated the death of a fictional character, Anna Garcia. She was found dead in her home after a concerned neighbor called 911. Students investigated the scene, gathered evidence, created a crime scene sketch and then moved to the lab to analyze their findings. So far, the students have

analyzed blood, matched fingerprints, identified hair and a shoeprint discovered at the crime scene. The final evidence lab tested the unknown pills found by Anna's body. We will determine the factors that led to Anna's death over the whole semester as we piece together evidence found in her medical history and autopsy reports.





Mr. Peters Medical Science Academy Class Spotlight

Mr. Peters HBS class used a revised version of The Amazing Race called Maniken Race in order to review for EOC testing. Maniken is the name of the $2\,\%$ foot mannequin that the student used to replicate the human body systems out of clay. The race was divide into 5 legs (5 weeks), with each leg covering a unit from the semester. Each leg of the race required stu-



dents to deduce clues and solve activities dealing with that unit. The students were timed for each leg and the team that complete the leg first would go out first the next week until final week. The first team that completed the race the final leg would win. The students were divided in team of two and had a blast compete for the final prize.


Ms. Gastreich's Medical Science Academy Class Spotlight

In Ms. Gastreich's Bio Innovations class, we are currently learning how to make effective presentations, both visually and orally. We are being taught about the importance of how we communicate information in the world of biomedical sciences! It is important that we learn how to effectively convey our information to an audience, in order to get our message across. This lesson consists of several ac-



tivities, one in particular is reflecting on previous experiences with giving presentations in the past, and trading strategies with a partner.

There is a wealth of information on the internet. As medicine progresses, we much know what sources are credible and which one's aren't. In this lesson also we are learning what sources are credible or not credible. Its important to know when doing our research to be clear that the information is correct and current. Although we are being taught these skills to help us in this particular class, it is an important skill we can all carry with us into the future and use in other classes, college, and work.

AP Chemistry Spotlight

In AP Chemistry you can explore topics you learned in regular chemistry and go more in



depth. You create visuals to help with understanding these topics like for example surface tension. You can do a lab that help you get a better understanding for surface tension by trying to make a paper clip float on water. You also get to do some fun and unique labs that help you get a different perspective on fields like calorimetry. One of the labs you get to do is burn food to see how many calories that food contains by measuring the difference in temperature. You will also learn about the atomic spectrum and how to use a spectroscope to determine different colors present for a particular light sources.

AP Environmental Science Spotlight

On February 2nd, AP Environmental Sciences students participated in their first lab. The lab was used to help students better understand the effects that abiotic factors have on organisms and their environment. This is one of the fundamental concepts of environmental studies. The AP course is taught by Ms. Kopchick and is very rigorous; therefore, classes actually began during Cougar Time. Those first few sessions allowed for students to hit the ground running. They've completed their first lab just one week into the semester. Students will spend the remainder of the year exploring the pivotal role that the environment plays in our lives. They will examine how humans have altered the environment and the inverse consequences that are often felt. Equipped with this knowledge AP Earth and Environmental students are slated to not only be more prepared for studying in a college setting, they will also become more environmentally conscious. The lab on Thursday highlighted just that. Brine Shrimp also known as "Sea Monkeys" were exposed to various environmental factors to see how they reacted. Students divided into groups and conducted separate







experiments, the data collected from each group was compiled to represent a full scale experiment. The Brine Shrimp were exposed to varying factors such as extreme temperatures, chemicals, and light. The lab was used to see which environmental conditions were ideal for shrimp survival. Students left the shrimp exposed to their varied conditions for fifteen minutes and then calculated the shrimp morality. While the experiment was fun for students it represented something larger. The conditions students exposed the shrimp to are similar to what occurs in the actual marine environment. The students used temperature, chemicals, and light to mimic environmental issues such as Global Warming and ocean pollution. Students learned that Brine Shrimp form the base of many food chains in marine ecosystems. Without them many larger organisms could be jeopardized. These labs are important because they allow students to make real world connects as it pertains to the environment around them. These labs are often simulations of what is happening in the world today. AP Environmental Sciences seeks to educate students on issues in our environment, students in turn become more aware. The hope is that students will become more responsible in their use of natural resources and practice environmentally sustainable habits. 



Attendance Letters and Recovery

-Attendance at school is a priority. It is so important to be present in order to learn and to gain opportunities for mastering coursework. This is also a very important life lesson for our children to learn—in life we have expectations of going to work and working to the best of our ability, and this good life habit starts with attendance at school.

- To ensure maximum student attendance we will be contacting students and parents when students reach 3, 6, and 8 absences.
- -According to UCPS attendance policy students should not miss more than 7 classes in each class. The goal is to not miss ANY school, but if a student has a valid reason, such as an illness or other excused absence, they can have up to 7 absences and still pass the class.
- -It is important that excuse notes be written and turned into the office within 3 days after an absence. After the three days, then the absences are recorded as unexcused permanently.
- At each absence threshold (3,6,8) CATA staff will make the determination if the student needs to begin the recovery process to make up absences and notify parents and students on how to make up time missed from school. Recovery should be done during the semester and in the two week time span given or the student will not be allowed to recover the absences at a later date.
- -There are UCPS limits on how many classes can be recovered. Recovery will be held on Tuesdays and Thursdays after school with Ms. Riley, or with the student's individual teacher. Students are expected to work on content during recovery time. This plan is in place so that your student makes up content close to the date it was delivered in class.


