

HISTORY OF WESTERN UNION ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Western Union Elementary School starting in 1940 was the first high school established in Union County. When the school was first established (in 1940), WUES was a school for African Americans only. WUES' first principal was Mr. E.H. Broome and he was one of the three teachers who first taught at WUES. The other two teachers were named Habakkuk B. Perry and Julia Gaynelle Manns.



There were only 4 rooms in Western Union, for ninety-six kids. In the first year there were only three people out of ninety-six kids who graduated.

Later on the school grew bigger, eventually the building was expanded. The African American children rode the first buses in Union County that allowed African Americans.

In 1954 the main building was destroyed by a big fire. It took two years to rebuild the school, all the children during this time took classes in buses, and in AME Zion Church, and also Redding Zion Church, this was all located in Monroe, Nc.

In 1940 WUES had 96 students and 3 teachers. In 1946 two buildings were added to be a part of Western Union, one for home economics and another for an agriculture department. In 1954 there were about 400 kids and 13 teachers. In 1956 when the school was rebuilt, the school had a 30 acre site. Also during 1956 there was much more space and there were 14 classrooms that were for grades 1-12, 27 teachers and more than 900 students! In 1959-1960 ten rooms were added, and then in 1964-1965 six rooms were added and a gymnasium. Shortly after 1965 there were 13 buses and over 1,000 kids riding them daily. The school continued to grow and is now an awesome place with amazing teachers!

United Kingdom: Harvest Festival

During this time Children make corn dolls, and they eat crops, and food produced by animals.
Children take gifts such as fruits and vegetables.

China: "Chung Chiu" Moon Festival

This celebration is on the on the 15th day of the eighth lunar cycle to celebrate the fall harvest. People stay with their whole family and have a feast for three days, with mooncakes and sweet cakes as the main food, these sweets are filled with sesame seeds, ground lotus seeds, and duck eggs.

South India: Pongal (the harvest festival)

There are four days during the whole celebration of Pongal. On the first day of Pongal celebrate the god Indra (the king of the gods and the god of the rain and clouds.) On the second day they celebrate the sun god (Surya) by eating a dish called Sakkara Pongal and they also eat sugarcane sticks. On the next day shepherds and cow herders give thanks to their cows and bulls, they do this by painting and decorating the animals. On the last day the people who celebrate this holiday visit family members, and celebrate a successful harvest.
