TOP 10 WAYS TO HELP YOUR CHILD PREPARE FOR KINDERGARTEN

1. Practice with fasteners (buttons, zippers, snaps, shoelaces) and food items to foster independence
2. Practice verbalizing needs
3. Recognize and write name
4. Practice letter recognition, sound awareness and writing some known letters
5. Practice fine motor skills by working with play dough, using scissors and writing with a variety of tools
6. Read daily (including nursery rhymes)
7. Talk about what you read together
8. Count objects, compare shapes and talk about colors
9. Engage your child in conversation often
10. Initiate time for your child to interact with children their age
