- Morning routine:
 The first bell rings at 7:50; students are cleared from the cafeteria as well as the student and bus lots at this time. Students are not allowed to linger in these areas in the interest of their safety.
 The tardy bell rings at 8:00
- Afternoon pick-up is also in the front of the school only! Parents, you will be asked to move if you are parked in the back of the school.
- Please remember that no outside vendors may be brought in for student lunches.

Revised Student Check-In and Check-Out Procedures

In the interest of student safety, front office staff has collaborated with administration on the following process. Please read carefully and review with your student.

Check In/Check Outs:

- 1. There have been issues with students leaving based on notes and emails from parents that are not legitimate. To avoid this problem, we will call parents to confirm notes received after 8 am and any email must be confirmed with a phone call before the student can leave. Early dismissal notes should be brought to Ms. King-Pierce's office before 8 am.
- 2. We will continue having students <u>check in</u> with Ms. King-Pierce (or Mr. Honeycutt in her absence). However, students will <u>check out</u> in the Front Office only. This is to make sure there is a parent to pick the student up. Students who are driving themselves should have that indicated on the note they turn in before school, or we will follow up with a call.

<u>Calling Parents for Permission to Leave Campus:</u>

- 1. When students become ill at school, they must come to the nurse or front office with a note from a teacher to call a parent for permission to drive home.
- **2.** THE FRONT OFFICE will then make the call on behalf of the student. If the parent wants to speak with the student, the student will call using the guest phone.
- **3.** We must still request notes via email or fax from parents with permission for students to leave campus, in addition to the phone call for verification purposes.

We will continue to review these procedures with students during school this week. Students who violate school policies will face disciplinary consequences. As always, student safety is our

Each Scholar receives a renewable scholarship covering full undergraduate tuition plus orientation and undergraduate student fees for four years. Campbell University will be offering on-site admissions during their visit on November 7th. When each student comes to meet with the representative, they can ask any questions, review their information then and there and hopefully be provided with an acceptance decision on the spot. Students can fill out the online application through Campbell's website or see Ms. Kanna for a paper application. Both are free.

Career & College Promise: Career and College Promise is a new initiative recently authorized by the State of North Carolina. It provides seamless dual enrollment opportunities for eligible North Carolina high school students. Career and College Promise provides the following options for students while they are still in high school: Core 44 College Transfer Pathways leading to a minimum of 30 hours of college credit OR Career Technical Education Pathways (CTE) leading to certificates, diplomas or degrees. Risky Teen Behaviors...E-Cigarettes

A growing trend among teens is the use of electronic cigarettes and hookahs. An electronic cigarette (or ecigarette) is an electronic <u>inhaler</u> meant to simulate and substitute for <u>tobacco smoking</u>. Other names associated with this concept include electronic vaping device, personal vaporizer (PV), and electronic nicotine delivery system (ENDS). These devices generally use a <u>heating element</u> that <u>vaporizes</u> a liquid solution. Some release <u>nicotine</u>, while some merely release flavored vapor. They are often designed to mimic traditional smoking implements, such as <u>cigarettes</u> or <u>cigars</u>, in their use and/or appearance.

The e-cigarette is a Chinese invention. The first ones came from the Ruyan company in 2004. According to media reports, Ruyan says it sold 300,000 e-cigarettes in 2008, and it's far from the only company making the devices. Some estimate millions are using these devices worldwide.

The e-cigarette comes in many shapes and sizes. Many look more or less like long cigarettes; others look like cigars or pipes. They all work the same basic way:

- The user inhales through a mouthpiece.
- Air flow triggers a sensor that switches on a small, battery-powered heater.
- The heater vaporizes liquid nicotine in a small cartridge (it also activates a light at the "lit" end of the ecigarette). Users can opt for a cartridge without nicotine.
- The heater also vaporizes propylene glycol (PEG) in the cartridge. PEG is the chemical of which theatrical smoke is made.
- The user gets a puff of hot gas that feels a lot like tobacco smoke.
- When the user exhales, there's a cloud of PEG vapor that looks like smoke. The vapor quickly dissipates. E-cigarettes contain no tobacco products; even the nicotine is synthetic.

The devices retail for \$100 to \$200. Refill cartridge packs vary in price depending on nicotine content, and liquid for do-it-yourself refills are sold, too. Each cartridge is good for several uses. Unfortunately teens have access to purchase these devices.

Public health officials are concerned about the message behind the marketing of these devices. The long term effects of these vapor inhaling devices are not known, whether they contain nicotine or not. The messaging could falsely be reassuring our youth and encouraging them to get into the nicotine habit. FDA spokeswoman, Rita Chapelle, voiced an overall concern in her statement, "We are concerned about the potential for addiction and abuse of these products. We don't want the public to perceive them as a safer alternative to cigarettes."

Our students and parents need to understand that UCPS Board of Education Policy prohibits the procession and use of these devices on school property. Violation of this policy places the student at risk for disciplinary action as well as the health risks associated with these devices.


