

Three bus loads traveled to the campus of NC State University and Raleigh on Saturday and brought home loads of accolades and happy Mavericks! In one venue, Dail Stadium at Derr Track, the Men's Soccer Team met the Cardinals of Jacksonville High School, the returning champions of the AAA bracket. In another, our Varsity Girls Cheerleading Squad was about to compete in the Medium Varsity Division on the mat at the Raleigh Convention Center.

In a thriller that was the highest scoring game in NCHSAA history, Klint Parker scored his second and the winning goal with less than two minutes remaining in the match. Mavs led 4-1 at the half, allowing the Cardinals to score three straight, before snapping out of it and exchanging a two tied scores. Other goals were scored by Kyle Enoch, Will Green, and Eric Newsome. With two goals as well, and one assist, senior Kyle Enoch was named MVP of the Championship.

A huge Maverick Orange Crush section, blackedout for this one, made the road trip to the Capital. Other Maverick fans and parents were joined late by several

varsity cheerleaders, who ran over to see the victory while waiting on their final results. NCHSAA hosts the Cheer Invitational each year, with 140 teams in this year's event. The girl competed in and won their division around 3:00 P.M., but winners were not announced until the awards ceremony began at 8:30 P.M. What a great day to be a Maverick!!

Special Programs:

HEELS FOR SUCCESS: Heels for Success is a one-day summer program to help academically-talented, <u>rising sophomores and juniors</u> prepare for college. Over the course of the day, students will learn techniques for approaching the ACT, explore the Carolina campus and its wide-ranging academic opportunities, as well as learn how to manage the college application process. They will also get the chance to connect with other outstanding students from across the country. Who is eligible for nomination? Heels for Success is designed for high achieving rising sophomores and juniors from diverse backgrounds, including underrepresented students, first-generation college students, and those from rural areas or disadvantaged backgrounds. Students should be academically motivated, rank in the <u>top 10%</u> of their class, be enrolled in a curriculum that includes (or will include) AP/IB/dual enrollment courses, foreign language, and advanced mathematics. Heels for Success nominees should show active involvement in extracurricular activities and have demonstrated leadership. How am I nominated? Counselors will be asked to nominate students in January. Please contact your school counselor for more information.

The **Stacey Palasek Memorial Scholarship** is a \$5,000 award that will be presented to a deserving female high school senior from Mecklenburg or Union Counties who plans to major in one of the hard sciences. Junior Elon Scholars Application & Nominations: The Junior Elon Scholars program serves academically talented high school juniors. These students demonstrate superior academic achievement and exceptional involvement in those activities which are highly valued as part of an Elon education. Selection is not based upon financial need. Benefits include the opportunity for early notification of acceptance to Elon, early consideration for a Presidential Scholarship valued at \$18,000 over four years, and an invitation to apply for Elon's prestigious Fellows Academic and Scholarship Programs. Candidates of a NC Junior Elon Scholars award should have: an "A" average, combined critical reading, math and writing SAT score of 1900 or higher or an ACT composite of 29 or higher, PSAT scores of 190 or higher or a PLAN score of 29 or higher, co-curricular achievements that should demonstrate sustained commitment and leadership. All SAT dates up to and including January 25th and all ACT dates up to and including December 14th prior to award notification beginning early March. 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Risky Teen Behaviors...Prescription Drug Abuse

The United States appears to be in the midst of a prescription drug abuse crisis among teens. A 2012 survey from The Partnership at Drugfree.org reported that 24% of high school students have abused these medications. That is a 33% increase from the 2008 survey. Unfortunately, the survey shows that 27% of teens mistakenly believe that prescription drug abuse is safer than "street drugs", such as cocaine or ecstasy. There is a reason prescription drugs are intended to be taken under a physician's direction and only for the person being prescribed the medication. Prescription drugs can have dangerous short- and long-term health consequences when used incorrectly or by someone other than for whom they were intended.

Opioids (such as the pain relievers OxyContin and Vicodin), central nervous system depressants (Xanax, Valium), and stimulants (Concerta, Adderall) are the most commonly abused prescription drugs. Medications available without a prescription, known as over-the-counters, can also be abused. Dextromethorphan (DXM), the active ingredient cough suppressant found in many cough and cold medications, is one example. This is abused by taking dangerously high doses, beyond the package instructions. Death and very serious health compromise have resulted from misuse and abuse of medications.

The majority of both teens and young adults obtain prescription drugs from friends and relatives, sometimes without their knowledge. Home medicine cabinets are the most common source of these medications. Too often teens are willing to take unknown medications, not realizing the use, purpose, or side effects. It is not uncommon for teens to take a combination of unknown medications, which can even be more dangerous.

Steps parents can take:

- Don't set a poor example by giving your teens prescription meds that may be on hand but not prescribed for that child (antibiotics, pain medications)
- Lock up all prescription medications. If your child is prescribed a commonly abused medication, monitor it closely.
- Properly dispose of medications no longer being used. Community disposal opportunities are offered through the Union County Sheriff's Department.
- Talk with your child about prescription drug abuse. Open communication with parents is still the number one influence on a child's decision to engage in risky teen behaviors.

Clearly, prescription medication abuse is as dangerous as other substance abuses, if not more so. Help get the word out and know where your child stands on these issues.

Two Marvin Ridge Teachers Win Grants





Kim Cooke, a Health and PE teacher along with Chris Roncone, an Art teacher were both presented with checks from the Union County Education Foundation. Ms. Cooke's grant will be used for students to create their own GoAnimate videos for class credit. In Health class, students will apply the healthful living essential standards by creating their own GoAnimate videos to demonstrate understanding of each core standard. When videos are completed, students will have the opportunity to "Show and tell" their project in class for credit. In Mr. Roncone's class, students will use the grant to expand art projects into 3D by creating sculptures that are situation based on events that happen in school. Students will utilize an inquiry based methodology to create an original, site specific sculpture in, and on, the Marvin Ridge High School campus. The sculptures will be created utilizing clear packaging tape, paint, and other materials as required by the students' designs. Footage and interviews will be taken during the planning, creation, and installation phases, as will student reactions to the sculptures after they have been installed on campus. The video footage will be utilized by Ms. Van Oldens' class and integrated into her curriculum for student editing and post production learning skills.
