This is finals week so please check the assessment schedule in the Maverick Message. Students need to attend the regularly scheduled testing session and be on time. Students that arrive late to school will not be allowed to take the test until the make- up session. All make-ups will be conducted on Friday, Jan. 17th, unless there is an approved special circumstance.

Students who are taking EOC tests in Math I, Biology, and English II must remember to bring their Chromebooks and chargers to school. These are state tests that students are required to take online, and we do not have extra computers or chargers.

We will not have newsletter or message next week; remember that Jan. 20, is a Holiday and there are teacher workdays on Jan 21 and 22.

Second semester classes begin on Jan 23. Schedule change requests will be accepted beginning tomorrow, Jan 13 and will end on January 29. Reasons for schedule changes are in the newsletter. **Exam Review Periods:** Attendance is required and will count as an absence if student does not attend or has an early dismissal. Early dismissals on any day, including Thursday, will require a parent note. These notes can be turned in to Ms. King-Pearce each morning. However, students may turn-in Thursday early dismissal notes beginning Wednesday.

**Type of Exams:** We have four types – EOC, NC Common Exams, IMS, and Teacher-Made. Your student's teacher can address which type your student will take next month. A list of EOC courses and NC Final Exams will be posted on our website soon. IMS tests are for all CTE courses. All other exams are teacher-made.

Attendance: Attendance during exam days is required for all students, for both exam sessions and review sessions. Our normal school hours apply, but the schedule and lunch times will be adjusted. January 17 is an important day for any students who have missed an exam earlier in the week due to illness.

Testing Window: New rules from NCDPI (North Carolina Department of Public Instruction) require that testing must be completed by January 17. This is true for ALL types of exams: EOC, NC Common Exams, IMS, and Teacher-Made.

**Percentage:** All high school exams count 25% of a student's grade for the semester. Please emphasize this point to students and help them to recognize the opportunity of a positive outcome and the consequence of a negative one.

Academic Integrity: Please remind students of our Academic Core Values on p.5 and posted in previous editions of the Maverick Message. The penalty for cheating of any kind is a "0" on a final exam. Students will be required to turn in cell phones during testing sessions, and it is our strong recommendation that they are not brought to school on these days.

# **International Baccalaureate Program**



The application process for the Union County Public School's International Baccalaureate Diploma Program at Marvin Ridge High School begins February 1, 2014. This program is open to all rising juniors in Union County who meet the criteria for acceptance. The IB Program is acknowledged around the world for providing a college-level curriculum during the student's junior and senior years. It is an integrated program of disciplinary study which emphasizes concurrency of learning, academic integrity, internationalism, breadth and depth of study, and education of the whole person. Students completing the IB Diploma Program are highly prepared and sought for post-secondary work in universities throughout the world. The International Baccalaureate Program in Geneva,

Switzerland, awards the IB Diploma. We recently awarded IB Diplomas to our Class of 2013, whose pass rate and diploma percentage was higher than the world average at 94%.

Admission in the program is highly competitive and is based on specific criteria stated in the application and student responses to curriculum prompts that will be given at the school on an upcoming Saturday. The application for the Class of 2016 will be available soon.

# **Schedules Changes for January 2014**

ALL requests must be submitted in writing or via email starting January 13. <u>Forms or emails received before this time cannot be processed.</u> Guidance Counselors will be contacting ALL students and parents via the contact information you provide as they get to your schedule in order of priority. Individual appointments with guidance counselors for schedule changes will not occur so that counselors have the ability to fairly devote time to each student's request.

### **Priority One Schedule Changes**

- There is a hole in your schedule (fewer than 8 classes)
- There is a class listed twice
- There is a class listed which you have already passed
- There is a class listed for which you have not passed the prerequisite

### **Priority Two Schedule Changes**

- Changes for graduation requirements
- Changes for college entrance requirements

### **Priority Three Schedule Changes**

- · Changes that administration/guidance determine are valid
- Elective Choices not listed as alternates please remember that all students were asked to list three alternates through your registration card. If you did not list any alternates, your schedule is subjected to NOT be changed.

Parents and students: PLEASE REMEMBER that we create our master schedule based on the classes students originally chose. This applies to classes offered as well as the number of sections available. Schedule changes for graduating seniors (Class of 2014) will be considered first, then other cohorts in descending order. Remember, Seniors must provide documentation approval from their college of acceptance in order to change courses this Spring.

We can only consider Priority Two and Three changes based on available space in the class requested. At this time, there is very limited space for moves. Additionally, requests for specific teachers are not considered. As much as we would like to honor all requests, most will simply not be possible. Thank you for your patience and understanding.

- Schedule changes may only be made within the <u>first five 5 days</u> of the semester.
- The last day to submit a schedule change is Wednesday, January 29.
- Course waivers should be signed with great caution. Be sure to read the waiver and communicate with the teacher if you have questions about the best class placement for your child.
