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Schedules Changes

ALL requests must be submitted in writing or via email on or after your student's grade level orientation day. Guidance Counselors will be contacting ALL students and parents via the contact information you provide as they get to your schedule in order of priority. Individual appointments with guidance counselors for schedule changes will not occur so that counselors have the ability to fairly devote time to each student's request.

Priority One Schedule Changes

- There is a hole in your schedule (fewer than 8 classes)
- There is a class listed twice
- There is a class listed which you have already passed
- There is a class listed for which you have not passed the prerequisite

Priority Two Schedule Changes

- Changes for graduation requirements
- Changes for college entrance requirements

Priority Three Schedule Changes

· Changes that administration/guidance determine are valid

• Elective Choices not listed as alternates – please remember that all students were asked to list three alternates through your registration card. If you did not list any alternates, your schedule is subjected to NOT be changed.

Parents and students: PLEASE REMEMBER that we create our master schedule based on the classes students originally chose. This applies to classes offered as well as the number of sections available. We can only consider Priority Two and Three changes based on available space in the class requested. At this time, there is very limited space for moves. As much as we would like to honor all requests, most will simply not be possible. Thank you for your patience and understanding.

- Schedule changes may also be made within the first 5 days of school **only**.
- Course waivers should be signed with great caution. Be sure to read the waiver and communicate with the teacher if you have questions about the best class placement for your child.

New Math Sequencing and Course Titles for 2013-2014

From the MRHS Math Department...

Math I: This is the same course that was taught as Algebra I in 2012 – 2013. It will follow the Common Core curriculum and can be referenced from the NCDPI wiki page* as Math I. It will have an EOC at the end.

Who enrolls? Any student who has not earned credit for Algebra I will take this course in 2013 – 2014. Barring a few exceptions, it should be only 9th graders.

- Math II: This is a new course that will follow Math I beginning in 2013 2014. It will follow the Common Core curriculum and can be referenced from the NCDPI wiki page* as Math II. <u>ALERT</u>: It is <u>not</u> just a new name for the traditional Geometry course that we have been teaching. <u>The curriculum is very different</u>. As we understand it at this time, there will be a Math II MSL/Common Exam at the end of the course.
 - Who enrolls? Any student who earned credit for Algebra I in 2012 2013 but did <u>not</u> earn credit for Geometry in 2012 2013 will take this course. Any student who earns credit for Math I in the fall of 2013 may enroll in this course in the spring of 2014.
 - This student may <u>not</u> "double up" because we are <u>not</u> teaching Math III (described below) in 2013 2014.
 - This student may <u>not</u> enroll in Algebra II in 2013 2014 as Math II and Algebra II are not sequential courses.
 - This student may <u>not</u> enroll in any advanced math course such as Advanced Functions and Modeling or PreCalculus in 2013 – 2014 as Math II and advanced math courses are not sequential courses.
- Algebra II: This is the same course as the Algebra 2 Common Core course that was taught in 2012 2013. This is the last year that we will teach this course. As we understand it at this time, there will be an Algebra II MSL/Common Exam at the end of the course.

Who enrolls? Any student who earned credit for Algebra I <u>and</u> Geometry in 2012 - 2013 or earlier. This student may also enroll in an advanced math course during second semester 2013 - 2014.

- Foundations of Math I: This is the same course that was taught as Foundations of Algebra in 2012 2013. It will be taught in the fall semester of 2013 and will have a teacher made exam at the end of the course. Who enrolls? The student who will benefit from a "full year" of Math I and typically is a weaker math student.
 - This student also will need to enroll in Math I in the spring semester of 2014 and will take the Math I EOC at the end of the 2013 2014 school year.
- Foundations of Math II: This course will prepare the student for a better experience in the Math II course. It will be taught in the fall semester of 2013 and will have a teacher made exam at the end of the course. Who enrolls? The student who will benefit from a "full year" of Math II and typically is a weaker math student.
 - This student also will need to enroll in Math II in the spring semester of 2014 and will take the Math II MSL/Common Exam at the end of the 2013 2014 school year.

4) Be prepared to participate in the Community Read Day events in the fall including class discussions and writing assignments in all of your classes.

 Help your child find a copy of the book by purchasing a copy or checking one out from a library.
