Mavs Take Action Against Bullying Week, November 17-21!

National statistics show that bullying is the most common form of violence, and over 3.2 million students are victims of bullying each year. Here some are other facts:



- About 58% of students admit that someone has said mean or hurtful things to them online. More than 4 out 10 say it has happened more than once.
- About 75% of students have visited a website bashing another student.
- **83** percent of girls and **79** percent of boys report being bullied either in school or online, and **75** percent of school shootings have been linked to harassment and bullying against the shooter.
- 43% of teens were victims of a cyberbully in the last year. **Cyberbullying** is defined as a young person tormenting, threatening, harassing, or embarrassing another young person or a school staff member using the Internet, social media, or other technologies, like cell phones.

To offset these startling statistics, this year, we will be focusing on creating a kinder school through Random Acts of Kindness! We perform Random Acts of Kindness when we go beyond what is expected of us and reach out to help another person. There are hundreds of ways to show someone that you care. This week, Mavs, will take action and look for opportunities to show that you care by performing Random Acts of Kindness for your classmates and school staff. **"No act of kindness, how-ever small, will go unnoticed."**

—All Week: Pay attention to the Deck the Halls Spread of Kindness. You can also buy a "Thank-A-Mav Card" during lunch through Friday where you can express your gratitude to someone by writing them a note! They will be 25 cents and come with a special treat! Practice all the great reading strategies you have learned in school like questioning, summarizing, annotating, predicting, inferring, visualizing, connecting, and evaluating.
3) Use the website above to learn more.
4) Be prepared to participate in the Community Read Day events in the fall including class discussions and writing assignments in all of your classes.

 Using the list of options, help your child choose a book that you think best meets his or her needs intellectually and emotionally.
 Help your child find a copy of the book by purchasing a copy or checking one out from a library.

Twenty three high school and middle school student councils with over 400 attendees from across the western part of North Carolina gathered at MRHS on Saturday, November 15 for the North Carolina Association of Student Councils (NCASC) Western District Conference. MRHS was awarded the conference after junior Alicia Nam ran for and won election to the office of Western District Chair at the 2013-14 NCASC State Conference last April. The conference was definitely the culmination of months of planning, organization, and committee meetings.



While at the fall conference, North Carolina student council members first heard introductions and a keynote speech from nationally recognized motivation Jeff Yalden. Members then went on a rotation of workshops and participated in a service project. The workshops, all 45 minutes in length and led by many MRHS students, consisted of topics such as time management, school spirit, and working with school administration. Students were also able to make holiday cards for the Ronald McDonald House of Charlotte, and over 400 cards were collected in total for the families at the House. The conference was closed by a concluding message from Jeff Yalden and an address by NCASC President Jake Peede. Overall, the day was full of leadership
