Important Final Exam Information from Marvin Ridge High School

Type of Exams:

We have four types – EOC, NC Common Exams, IMS, and Teacher-Made. Your student's teacher can address which type your student will take next month. A list of EOC courses and NC Final Exams will be posted on our website. IMS tests are for all CTE courses. All other exams are teacher-made.

Attendance:

Attendance during exam days is required for all students, for both exam sessions and review sessions. Our normal school hours apply, but the schedule and lunch times are adjusted (see above). January 16 is an important day for any students who have missed an exam earlier in the week due to illness. We regret that family vacation plans are not excused, and students cannot take exams early. We apologize that any requests for exceptions cannot be honored.

Testing Window:

All exam testing must be completed between January 12 and January 16. This is true for ALL types of exams: EOC, NC Common Exams, IMS, and Teacher-Made. Students may not test early, and if absent on an exam day, they must make arrangements to be at school on the make-up day in order to meet the approved testing window time-frame.

Score Results:

All high school exams count 25% of a student's grade for the semester. Please emphasize this point to students and help them to recognize the opportunity of a positive outcome and the consequence of a negative one.

Exam review:

All teachers are expected to help students with review during class time and to distribute a review guide to students prior to testing. Study guides will also be available on teacher Moodle pages or websites. Please look for these after winter break, but

it is never too early for your student to begin organizing and reviewing material.

Academic Integrity:

Please remind students of our Academic Core Values on p.7 of the current Maverick Message and that have been posted in previous editions of the Maverick Message. **The penalty for cheating of any kind is a "0" on a final exam.** Students will be required to turn in cell phones during testing sessions, and it is our strong recommendation that they are not brought to school on these days.

Your student's success is always our primary concern. Please contact the school (your child's teachers, alpha-assigned counselor, or alpha-assigned grade level administrator) if you have any questions or concerns.

Special Announcement About Work Keys Testing:

Work Keys is a reportable and required test by NCDPI. Results are a part of our school report card grade, so it is a very important opportunity for our seniors.

Students who qualify, through their CTE course enrollment, must take the test. Students will be notified by Ms. Steere, our Career Development Coordinator, that they will be testing.

We have 67 seniors (this round) who will test on either December 16 or 17 during first and second periods in the media center. Administration will meet briefly with them as a group prior to testing on Friday, December 12.

Please be aware that the test will be given again next semester.

Students, what should you do?

- 1) Select at least one book from the list to explore.
- 2) As you read, keep an open mind and consider what you are learning from the book. Practice all the great reading strategies you have learned in school like questioning, summarizing, annotating, predicting, inferring, visualizing, connecting, and evaluating.
- 3) Use the website above to learn more.
- 4) Be prepared to participate in the Community Read Day events in the fall including class discussions and writing assignments in all of your classes.

Parents, how can you get involved?

- 1) Using the list of options, help your child choose a book that you think best meets his or her needs intellectually and emotionally.
- 2) Help your child find a copy of the book by purchasing a copy or checking one out from a library.
- 3) Feel free to join the community read by reading one or more of the books on the list. You will even have the opportunity to participate in book club discussions with other parents and staff on Community Read Day.

Chinese classes welcome guest, learn Calligraphy from well-known artist

On November 24, the Chinese I and II classes welcomed Mr. Zhang Zhanli, an instructor at Pfeiffer University, to teach them the different styles of Chinese Calligraphy. The four major styles that they mastered include: standard, cursive, seal, and clerical. Each student was given some ink, a calligraphy brush, and a sheet of paper, which made the lesson fully interactive.

The class began with a powerpoint presentation over the origins of characters. Next, each student had the opportunity of writing the character of the horse in the 4 major different styles. The stroke order of writing Chinese characters has several rules including: top to bottom, left to right, horizontal before vertical, inside before bottom enclosing, center verticals before outside "wings," cutting strokes last, left vertical before enclosing, top or upper-left dots first, and lastly, inside or upper-right dots.

Some lucky students even received a copy of the character made by the instructor with his signature, which is similar to an autograph.

"I thought that it was interesting how they have different fonts," student Lisa Walter said.



"I thought it was fun. I learned hold to hold the brush and how to use it. I also learned the history about the calligraphy. I also got to keep one of his artworks." Nicholas Sliv stated.

The class really appreciated the instructor's presence and enjoyed writing calligraphy. "It was very difficult holding the brush and writing, but you get used to it after writing the same character twice. I am very thankful for this opportunity and I will continue to write with these styles," Dequarius Walker commented.

Despite the short class of 90 minutes, the students thoroughly enjoyed learning various styles of Chinese writing and the history of the characters.
