Important Final Exam Information from Marvin Ridge High School

Type of Exams:

We have four types – EOC, NC Common Exams, IMS, and Teacher-Made. Your student's teacher can address which type your student will be taking. A list of EOC courses and NC Final Exams will be posted on our website. IMS tests are for all CTE courses. All other exams are teacher-made.

Attendance:

Attendance during exam days is required for all students, for both exam sessions and review sessions. Our normal school hours apply, but the schedule and lunch times are adjusted (see p.2). January 16 is an important day for any students who have missed an exam earlier in the week due to illness. We regret that family vacation plans are not excused, and students cannot take exams early. We apologize that any requests for exceptions cannot be honored.

Testing Window:

All exam testing must be completed between January 12 and January 16. This is true for ALL types of exams: EOC, NC Common Exams, IMS, and Teacher-Made. Students may not test early, and if absent on an exam day, they must make arrangements to be at school on the make-up day in order to meet the approved testing window time-frame.

Score Results:

All high school exams count 25% of a student's grade for the semester. Please emphasize this point to students and help them to recognize the opportunity of a positive outcome and the consequence of a negative one.

Exam review:

All teachers are expected to help students with review during class time and to distribute a review guide to students prior to testing. Study guides will also be available on teacher Moodle pages or websites.

Academic Integrity:

Please remind students of our Academic Core Values on p.7 of the current Maverick Message and that have been posted in previous editions of the Maverick Message. **The penalty for cheating of any kind is a "0" on a final exam.** Students will be required to turn in cell phones during testing sessions, and it is our strong recommendation that they are not brought to school on these days.

Your student's success is always our primary concern. Please contact the school (your child's teachers, alpha-assigned counselor, or alpha-assigned grade level administrator) if you have any questions or concerns.

- 2) As you read, keep an open mind and consider what you are learning from the book. Practice all the great reading strategies you have learned in school like questioning, summarizing, annotating, predicting, inferring, visualizing, connecting, and evaluating.
- 3) Use the website above to learn more.
- 4) Be prepared to participate in the Community Read Day events in the fall including class discussions and writing assignments in all of your classes.

Parents, how can you get involved?

- 1) Using the list of options, help your child choose a book that you think best meets his or her needs intellectually and emotionally.
- 2) Help your child find a copy of the book by purchasing a copy or checking one out from a library.
- 3) Feel free to join the community read by reading one or more of the books on the list. You will even have the opportunity to participate in book club discussions with other parents and staff on Community Read Day.
- 4) Talk with your child about the book. See the suggestions below.
- 5) Encourage your child to pick up other books that interest him or her.

Earlier in December, Marvin Ridge High School also hosted the 2014 DECA District 6B competition. DECA is an international organization that prepares emerging leaders in marketing, finance, hospitality and management in high school and colleges around the globe. Marvin Ridge hosted seven other schools from the surrounding areas with nearly 150 students in attendance. Students competed in categories such as Sports and Entertainment Marketing, Quick Serve Restaurant Management, Retail Merchandising, Principles of marketing, and Apparel and Accessories Marketing.



These competitions consisted of a marketing test and a 'role-play' or mock business scenario. Two students from Marvin Ridge placed in the top three of their event at the closing ceremony and numerous others made proficiency. Jordan Braswell, senior, received 2nd overall in Apparel and Accessories Marketing and Adam Fisher, sophomore, came in 1st overall in Sports and Entertainment Marketing. With the help of numerous volunteers from the community, the competition went off without a hitch. A number of students from Marvin Ridge now plan to attend the State competition that will be held in Greensboro, North Carolina this February.
