Complete the writing assignment below:

Respond to ONE question below in one essay. The bold-faced titles are the original chapters from the book. The questions appear below and should be answered with reference to *a novel of your choice and How To Read Literature Like a Professor*. Make sure to include specific examples from the works that you choose! Be sure to double space!

Chapter 1 -- Every Trip Is a Quest (Except When It's Not)

Apply your understanding of the quest (journey) motif to *the novel of your choice*. Make sure to include specific examples from the works that you choose!

Chapter 2 and Chapter 3 - Nice to Eat with You - Acts of Communion/Acts of Vampires Apply your understanding of the meaning behind sharing meals to *a novel of your choice*. Make sure to include specific examples from the works that you choose!

Chapter 5 - Now Where Have I Seen Her Before?

Apply your understanding of recurring characters to *a novel of your choice*. Make sure to include specific examples from the works that you choose!

Chapters 6 - Chapter 9 - When in Doubt, It's from Shakespeare....Or the Bible...Or Fairy Tales...Or Myth.

Apply your understanding of recurring narratives to *one novel of your choice*. Make sure to include specific examples from the works that you choose!

A Note on Grading

- 1. The first question you ask will be "How long does this have to be?" The answer is "Long enough and no longer."
- 2. Answer all parts of the question. Typically you are identifying and describing the ideas discussed in the chapter and then relating those ideas to a novel that you have read. The more comparisons you make, the more convincing your essay.
- 3. Use specific details. I assume that you only know what you write down. Therefore, you must be specific in your discussions so that I know you have specific understanding of these ideas.
- 4. Do your best to edit for spelling, grammar, and mechanics.
- 5. Finally, this is a diagnostic essay which means that while it is a grade, it is not an *essay* grade:

- Essays that contain words related to the topic but that cannot be formed into an answer to the prompt in any but the most remote manner will receive a 70
- Essays that show to me that you submitted a rushed, ill-conceived, rather vapid attempt to answer the prompt according to the given directions will receive an 80
- Essays that show to me what I perceive to be an average but rather robotic attempt to answer the prompt according to the given directions will receive a 90.
- Essays that reveal an elevated, determined and thoughtful attempt to answer the prompt according to the given directions will receive a 100
- Essays that contain information from outside sources will receive a 0. You are not writing a research paper. You are writing an analysis.
