

Looking for Summer Education Options?



Students can now apply online for the 2023 Summer Term High School Programs at Boston University, via <u>our website</u>. This coming summer, they are offering five pre-college programs, each of which provides rigorous and collaborative college life experiences that will enable students to gain a strong sense of their personal and academic potential. Here is a brief overview of each:

<u>High School Honors</u> is a six-week residential, commuter, or online program in which students take Boston University undergraduate courses and earn up to 8 transferable college credits. Students must be entering their junior or senior year of high school in fall 2023.

<u>RISE Internship/Practicum</u> is a six-week, non-credit residential or commuter program in which students conduct scientific research in a university lab under the guidance of a faculty mentor. Students must be entering their senior year of high school in fall 2023.

<u>Academic Immersion (AIM)</u> is a three-week, non-credit residential or commuter program for students to focus intensively on a single academic topic while experiencing life on a college campus. This summer we are offering three AIM tracks: Introduction to Experimental Psychology; Introduction to Medicine; and Creative Writing. Each track combines classroom work in the subject area with hands-on experiential learning activities. Students must be entering their junior or senior year of high school in fall 2023.

<u>Summer Challenge</u> is a two-week residential or online program in which students take two non-credit seminars of their choice and experience college life. Students must be entering their sophomore, junior, or senior year of high school in fall 2023.

<u>Summer Preview</u> is a one-week, non-credit residential or commuter program in which students explore one subject of interest while previewing the college experience. Students must be entering eighth grade or their freshman or sophomore year of high school in fall 2023.

For students curious about what it means to be a journalist, reporting and producing news that informs communities, the Scripps Howard Emerging Journalists Program at Elon University provides the ideal platform to explore their media interests.

Visit Elon University's website at <u>Elon University / School of Communications / Scripps Howard Emerging Journalists</u> <u>Program at Elon</u> for more information on the application.

The goal is to engage hundreds of high school students from around the country, providing hands-on journalism experience. Through the program's virtual Exposure component, students will participate in four interactive learning sessions and build foundational journalism skills.

The second phase of the program, Immersion, brings high school juniors to Elon for a summer on-campus residential learning workshop.

Additionally, students who complete the Immersion program will be assigned two mentors — an Elon communications student and a professional journalist — to help identify, report and produce multimedia stories during their senior year of high school.

There are countless opportunities in journalism, and the Exposure component of the Emerging Journalists Program is designed to give you the foundational skills to see what a collegiate or professional career could look like as a storyteller.

What's involved

Participants in the Exposure experience get access to virtual educational opportunities throughout spring 2023 to learn about journalism and communications careers and the importance and power of their voice. Although each session assumes no previous journalism knowledge, even students who already are involved in high school publications will walk away with new skills and perspectives.

What you get

*Four learning sessions on foundational journalism skills, including News Gathering & Writing; Editing & Design; Photojournalism & Multimedia Broadcast; and Law & Ethics.

*A certificate of completion for completing all four session assessments.

*High school juniors from diverse socio-economic, racial or ethnic backgrounds who successfully complete the Exposure experience will be invited to apply for the Immersion experience, a 12-day, experiential learning workshop on Elon University's campus with travel, lodging, meal and instructional expenses paid for by EJP.

Who's eligible

Anyone may apply to take part in the Exposure experience. There is no cost, although participants will need to have access to technology for accessing virtual sessions and completing assessments.

Helpful Hints from the Counseling Department



Strategies to Staying Calm During Tests (continued)

At the exam:

*Approach the exam with confidence. View the exam as an opportunity to show how much you've studied and to receive a reward for the studying you have done.

*Read the directions carefully

*Budget your test taking time

*Change positions to help you relax

*If you go blank, skip the question and go on. Remember that you do not have to take the test in any order. If you find essays easiest, do these first. If you prefer the multiple choice section, do these first. If you want, work on the questions that are easiest for you... oftentimes they will trigger answers for other questions. If you ever blank on an essay, jot down anything you can recall on scratch paper or on the back of a page to stimulate your memory and get your mind working.

*Don't hesitate to ask for clarification from the teacher if you have questions about directions, procedure, etc., rather than let anxiety build up because you aren't sure about what you are expected to do.

*Relax yourself physically during the test, if you notice that you are not thinking well or are tight. Pause, lay your test aside, and take several slow, deep breaths. Concentrate on your breathing. Do this if you notice that you are worrying excessively about one problem, not reading carefully, forgetting information you know.

*Pay attention to the test, not to yourself and others. Don't waste time worrying, doubting yourself, wondering how other people are doing, blaming yourself, etc. Don't worry about what you should have done; pay attention to what you can do now.

*Don't panic when students start handing in their papers. Take the whole period if you need to. There's no reward for being the first done and test-taking is not a race. Often the thoughtful, slower students do better than the fast, careless ones.
